President's Message

Golden Wedding – 50 Years in MAGA

At its peak the APIA club featured international shows and sported one of the best sight-reading, accompanying bands in Sydney. Led by Dick Buchannan and comprising of: Dick on t/bone & tpt, Stan Wilson tpt, Col Loughnan reeds, Billy Nuku drums, Tom Williams piano and yours truly on bass. Being in that band with such talented players it was inevitable that I would become interested in arranging. The setting was perfect because I could instantly hear what I wrote and get some advice from the players and the 3 other MAGA members on board, namely Dick Buchannan, Col Loughnan and Stan Wilson. It was Dick Buchannan that encouraged me to apply for MAGA membership and sit for a copying test. Being young and cocky I thought I'd go straight for an arranging membership!

The structure of MAGA in those early days was quite different. Not only was the head office Sydney based, but the committee was totally from Sydney too, with reps from each state organizing their local branches.

Membership applications were done by mail and tests were done in person under the supervision of a committee member. Turning up for my arranging test at Don Rankin's music store was nerve-wrecking! I was allowed to bring the sheet music of 3 tunes (one of them to be chosen by the testing member) score paper and a pencil! My goodness, I couldn't hold on to the pencil because my hands were sweating so much.

Being a member of such a respected body was a great privilege. It instantly branded you as a serious arranger who took the time to produce quality work. No sequencing programs to listen to or engraving programs to help you with graphic layouts. Straight from the head, to the paper, to the players, with a fee in between of course. The other benefit was that once accepted and you got your MAGA ARRANGER stamp, you were now rubbing shoulders with all the other great arrangers of the period. Therefore, you had a greater chance to be considered seriously when pitching for high level contracts.

The great motivating force that drove MAGA's founding members to form this organization was exploitation! With TV in its infancy, recording being done live in studio, lots of live cabaret artists performing at a myriad of live venues (like the Tivoli with 2 bands and revolving stage) MAGA played a powerful role in securing fees for its members that allowed for gaining a reasonable life-style.

I got interested in the mechanics of running MAGA at the executive level, early in the piece. I successfully ran for committee and got in by defeating the other applicants. In those days we actually had many applicants challenging each committee position. It's on record that I have spent more time on the Board of MAGA than any other member. From Board member to Treasurer, to Vice President and recently as President, I have enjoyed working with all the Executive Boards and feel privileged to have been contributing to keeping MAGA Inc alive and contributing to its growing presence in today's music scene.

Minnie Hill is a Melbourne based composer, arranger and saxophonist who primarily writes and arranges works for big band and smaller jazz settings. While Minnie arranges for her own projects and bands, she has also composed and arranged music for the Daryl McKenzie Jazz Orchestra, Paris Cat Big Band, both Jazz Melbourne Studio Youth Big Bands and school ensembles.

In 2019, Minnie's big band composition 'Silver's Swing' was selected for the VCAA 'Top Sounds' concert, recorded at the Iwaki Auditorium in Melbourne and highlighted the best student compositions across Victoria. As a performer, Minnie was lead alto in the invitation only Jazz Melbourne Studio Youth Big Band 1 (2019)

Model Arrangers Contract

A message from Gregory Flood (MAGA Board Member and Lawyer @ FLOOD + CHALMERS + MEADE)

20 July 2020

Dear All

You will have recently received an email notifying you of the new Model Arrangers Contract.

Members of the Executive have worked long and hard to enable this resource to be made available as part of your membership so it comes with years of experience and work behind it.

Just a few notes about it and how you can use it.

- 1 It is designed for you to use for arrangements for live performance (not for recordings/film soundtracks etc).
- 2 It allows you to insert all relevant information in an easy manner by filling out the schedule rather than having to amend the standard clauses.
- 3 It is a "*standard form*" agreement meaning that although it is not specifically drafted for your situation it is intended to cover the bulk of our members "*bread and butter*" agreements. If you have complex terms or negotiations it is always best to get specific legal advice.
- 4 Please make sure you do not leave any item in the schedule empty as this may make your agreement harder to enforce.

Consider each item in the schedule carefully and complete the information that you have agreed with the commissioning party. If the item doesn't apply then please ensure you insert N/A in the relevant item to ensure there is no disagreement later as to whether the item applied.

- 5 When you and the commissioning party are both happy I recommend you sign in the relevant space and then both initial the bottom of each page so you both know which version you agreed.
- 6 Keep a copy of the signed agreement.

Again, we hope this resource assists you with your work and please let me know if you have any questions.

I am always happy to answer any basic queries from members.

A new satirical musical inspired by the Covid19 epidemic was hatched from lockdown in London and then, mandatory quarantine in a Melbourne hotel by myself and my partner, writer and performer, Amanda Jane Pritchard.

The idea for *Coronavirus the Musical Musical* (a tale of one cashed up bogan's ruthless attempt to stage his mediocre "Extinction Rebellion" musical in the wake of the Covid19 pandemic), came to us in the early stages of lockdown in London, when our roles in a West End musical project were cancelled.

We wanted to get started immediately. I wrote an overture and Amanda Jane wrote a dramatic opening scene. With many artists losing their gigs, we then asked musical friends from around the world to record their parts in isolation.

Recordings from mobile devices flew in from all over the world. Dame Evelyn Glennie (Snare Drum), Andrew Bain (Principal Horn LA Phil), Professor Peter Luff (Deputy Director Queensland Conservatorium), Sarah Curro (1st Violin Melbourne Symphony), Alasdair Malloy (Principal Percussion BBC Concert Orchestra), John Jorgenson (Elton John Band), Sonia Croucher (Principal Piccolo Malaysian Philharmonic); Australian Jazz virtuoso Andy Firth, and singers; Kate Ceberano AM, Katie Noonan, Simon Gallagher and Rhonda Burchmore OAM were just a handful of the 112 artists to volunteer their time, sending over 200 audio files and videos.

We also asked everyone to video record themselves, so that we would have a fabulous piece of audio-visual art to share with everyone on social media. I spent countless hours editing each individual audio file and made stems to send to audio-producing genius Geoff McGahan who edited the overture to broadcast quality. It's hard to believe it has been largely recorded on mobile devices and in complete isolation.

The overture itself covers genres including modern classical, jazz, rock, country, Celtic and choral and sets the opening scene, which is a brawl in a supermarket.

I started with a five-staff short score – two percussion staves and three piano staves. This would eventually lead to the instrumentation of picc, 2fl, ob, 2cl, bc, bsn, sop sax, alto sax, ten sax, bari sax, 4 horns, 4tpts, 3trb, euph, tuba, snare, xylo, chimes, timpani, drum kit, guitars, jazz bass, melodica, accordion, scissors, wine bottle, bag pipes, choir, vln I, vln II, vla, cell, contra bass – with solos on clarinet and gypsy guitar.

As always, I try to say a lot with only a few snippets of music. It's all about the choice of colours and orchestration.

The main themes are: 2 Orchestral and 1 Jazz




The work begins with a bombastic traditional orchestration with some interesting unison horns to provide a sense of counter melody (not pictured) and some flourishes in percussion and harp. At bar 10 – a jaunty little melody is played on piccolo and when repeated has xylophone and tuba in unison. Jazz takes over at bar 15 and then a couple of solos are added.

The chords are all based on m7b5 chords:

As with all orchestration, it's important to let "all" parts have their moment. For example - Dame Evelyn Glennie wanted to play snare drum, so I gave her space to shine:



MAGA Trustee, Henry J. "Doc" Bertram turns 100!

http://australiansatwarfilmarchive.u nsw.edu.au/archive/513-henrybertram Born in Sydney in 1920 and educated at Earlwood Public and Canterbury High Schools, Doc further trained at Sydney Technical College as a Mechanical Fitter (with theory and mechanical drawing) and was apprenticed to an engineering firm. He studied Mouth Organ and Bass Mouth Organ at Horrie Dargie's Harmonica School in Sydney; from late 1938, he further studied Double Bass.

During the 1940s, Doc played in dance bands, nightclubs, The Billy Weston Big Band etc. and joined Horrie Dargie and two others for a Tivoli tour of New Zealand. During the tour a vocal instrumental Novelty Quartet was formed. By December 1951 (and back in Australia) a pianist was added to the act and this became the famous Horrie Dargie Quintet.

The Quintet worked extensively and by November 1952, they left for the United Kingdom, working variety theatres, television, radio etc, where Doc was married and started a family. Doc returned to Australia in March 1958 for two Tivoli tours and joined GTV9 Melbourne in 1959. By the early 1960s he began copying and playing Bass in a band at the Silver Spade Room at the Sydney Chevron Hotel. During this time, Doc joined MAGA.


From 1972-86 played in various bands and groups throughout Australia and, after retiring in 1986, he returned to Sydney where he continued copying until the mid-1990s.
