President's Message

As we head into the final part of 2023 it is pleasing to be hearing reports that our industry is emerging strongly from the last three years with more and more gigs coming back. Given that APRA/ AMCOS have estimated that over 1300 live music venues throughout Australia permanently closed during the pandemic we hope that recovery can continue. Hopefully during this year, you will have had a chance to attend our seminar series or view the recordings on line. The generosity of our presenters has been extraordinary as has been the information they have shared. If you haven't seen them all I would encourage you to log into your MAGA account and catch up. There is always something to learn when the best in the business share their insights.

I am sure by now all of you have been touched and impressed by the increasing power of Artificial Intelligence (AI) even if it is just to laugh at celebrity mockups. But there is a warning for musicians and especially our members here.

Publishers and authors have been campaigning loudly against the illegal use of their work where AI is scanning such work to train it to replicate styles and create new works in that specific style.

It is not hard to imagine just how damaging this can be to all creative industries including our own. Imagine an untrained musician being able to ask the software to create a big band arrangement in the style of Sammy Nestico, Maria Schneider or Vince Mendoza, a vocal arrangement in the style of Gene Puerling or pop arrangement in the style of Jimmie Haskell. It is incumbent on all of us to work hard to understand the benefits and the downsides of such technologies. Unfortunately the laws of copyright are not keeping up with the speed at which this technology is advancing and it is the creative industries that will suffer if the protections are not put in place now. I urge you to explore the risks many experts are writing about and make sure our law-makers understand our concerns.

In the meantime, I wish you well in your continuing professional journey and look forward to hearing of your work and success.

Vale Mike Tseng #93

It is with sadness we have recently learned of the passing of MAGA Honorary Member Mike Tseng #93 on January 25th 2023.

Mike was Secretary from 1992-2001, and President in 1991 as well as an Executive member. He was a fantastic arranger and musician and was a very active MAGA member for many years.

We would like to offer Mikes daughter Veronica Tseng-Donald, and their entire family our sincere condolences.

Michael Tseng writes:

My own life & careers might be of interest to you.

I had always had an interest in playing music since the start with the Sandosham brothers in 1950. My capability in playing Dance Music progressed from the time that Gerry Soliano was teaching me the clarinet for me to take that chair in the SJI Orchestra since 1950. After school, I was taught the trumpet by Concordia Soliano in 1952, enough for me to take the 2nd trumpet chair in the Sambodian Orchestra & the Blue Note Dance Band. All the time, my talent as a pianist had also progressed accordingly, so much so that I was sitting in with Bands at the New World & Great World Cabarets, and even the famous Raffles Hotel. That horrified my father when he found out. You know how 'wicked' cabarets were in those days. He immediately ordered me to take on a Uni. course overseas as I was interested in Engineering. That was how I landed in Sydney in '53.

I continued to be interested in music while here and self-taught & progressed as the years went by. When I was admitted to Sydney U. in 1954, I was leading the Uni. Jazz Band then- after. I also played in Night Clubs and 'ponteng' [*skip*] lectures to do tours with American visiting artists who were top Rock 'N' Roll popstars at that time. I was also a 'pioneer' of pop music on television which was starting up in 1957 and subsequently, was in articles in music journals & the press in Sydney.

Of course, that also meant I didn't pass exams every year because I used to 'ponteng' lectures to go on tour of Australian Cities with US Groups like the Platters, Diamonds, & stars like Bobby Darren, Chuck Berry, Bobby Rydell, Frankie Avalon etc etc. In 1955 whilst playing in a Band at a Uni. function, I met an Aussie-Chinese girl who I subsequently married in 1958 when I was in 3rd year Uni. Soon we'll be celebrating our 46th Wedding Anniversary. I subsequently graduated in 1959 and continued to work both as an Engineer & a professional musician on piano as well as vocalising. I was subsequently known as the S'pore George Shearing on Piano & Nat King Cole on vocals.

I returned to work in the PWD S'pore in Jan '61 but soon discovered that as a Govt Servant, I wasn't allowed to do 2 professions. So, I 'churri churri' again and did work on the sly in places like the Princes Restaurant in Orchard Road, the American Club, the Raffles Hotel, the Adelphi Hotel, the Dutch & Island Clubs etc etc. and writing & composing Radio & TV Commercials such as the Brylcream & Rothmans etc Ads, which I also recorded in various S'pore studios.

However after the racial riots in 1964 and the unsatisfactory feeling of having to work on the sly in the music profession, I decided to return to Sydney, where I could work in the 2 professions. By then, I was also an established music orchestrator & arranger writing for TV Artists & Band Leader, while I progressed ultimately to the position of Principal Engineer in one of Australia's largest consulting firms. When that firm started a joint venture with a Malaysian firm, I was asked to manage the operations in KL where I was from Nov.'81 to July '84. On my return to work in Sydney, I suffered a heart attack in Nov. '85 whilst

on holidays at the Gold Coast. After a lot of thought, I decided I couldn't continue doing the two professions, so I never continued in the Engineering Job after that.

Thus, from 1986 onwards, I was solely a professional musician-entertainer & music orchestrator (music Arranger as we are known in the profession). I held the post of Secretary in the Music Arrangers Guild of Australia for some 11years, representing the professional interests of music notators (both manuscript & computer types) all over Australia. It was a registered professional Association, corporatised as an organisation by me.

I retired from that post last year but currently, still do work as a musician-entertainer cum Band Leader (I have been leading a 5-piece Dance Band at the Liverpool Catholic Club every Thurs night for over 11yrs) and last New Year's Eve, I finished 11yrs service at a Returned Soldiers Club leading the Band there.

I don't work as much now but not from a lack of trying. I turn 69 in March so I'm entitled to a life of retirement soon. (I think I'm one of the youngest in the SJI Class of '51. Together with my pal, Fong Fook Kai, having started school in 1945 in Primary 2, then progressed in double promotions to Std 2, 4 & 6, before facing the fierce (I think) Bro. Henry in Std 7, with the rest of the Class of '51. Maybe because when we finished school, I was not yet 17yrs yrs old and still not fully grown in height & build, that's why, Bro Henry didn't recognise me when the next time we met, was in 1973, and by then I was much taller (I'm 6ft 7in) and broader. That's what I said in my email message to the re-union gathering, " that he didn't remember me even tho' he taught me for the last 3yrs of my school life").

50 Years of Membership - Phil Crawshaw

In Phil's words, after letting him know of 50 years' membership.

What a pleasant surprise! I didn't realise that it had been this long for me. I would like to share my music journey to encourage the younger members starting out in the industry now.

After finishing my 4-year University degree in arts/music, I spent 2 years doing National Service in the Eastern Command Army Band under Band master – Major Tom Whalan. I came into the band as a trumpet player, but I have never forgotten Major Tom's opening sentence to me, and I quote: "Private Crawshaw I believe you have a Music Degree?" – (I wondered where this was going). Then he said, and I quote, "OK – you have joined us as a trumpet player. How many French horns [players] do we have in the band"? Of course, I answered quickly "You have [three]". Then Tom said to me, "How many horn players should I have?" Of course [Mr QUALIFIED me] ANSWERED: "You should have 4". His answer floored me: "Very good private – a man with your musical experience should be able to pick it up to play" (now I was getting worried).



Then he said "Congrats you are my new 4th French horn player. Get one out of the Q store and see Sgt Digger Burgess to show you the ropes and how to play it – you will sit in the horn section from tomorrow". I now wondered where the hell this was going – but this was to be the beginning of my greatest learning curve.

In the 18 months I was in the Army Band, he had me playing all brass instruments as well as Flute, Clarinet, Sax, Percussion, Drums, and Piano. I have thanked God and Tom for this wonderful learning curve, his encouragement and patience.



After leaving National Service, and starting teaching at North Ryde High School, the school band I inherited only had 8 music students at that time. By the time I left teaching in 1977, we had a full co-ed marching and playing military band – from years 7 to 12 – with an all-girl drum corps – and concert-type military band that played in shopping centres, marched in parades in Sydney and even performed on Channel 10 in Simon Townsend's Wonder World.

Fairfax media quoted Mr. Phil Crawshaw as, "the Music Master at North Ryde High School who has revolutionized the teaching of music by making use of an electric organ and a number of synthesizer keyboards".

We even had roadies – and in the last 2 years of teaching, the students even played a couple of times at the Sydney Opera House. The headmaster and I were proud to sit in the audience at these public concerts.



The band leaders were lads in year 11 and our conductor was a year 12 pupil! The band had become 167 personnel out of 900 school kids in total. Also, many of the people in this band went on in adult life working in professional bands. The Conductor went on to become a Doctor of Music and Lecturer at Newcastle University, and the band master became headmaster in the system.

I don't know how many times I would read a program when I would go to the theatre and recognise the people I had taught, playing in the pit.

I caught up with one of them about 10 years ago, just before I retired. He had won a Moe award for his backing and playing in shows and charts – Steve Isoadi. I also came across one of the trumpet players from yester-years who had just retired himself. (He was 10 years younger than me when I was a teacher). He retired from his job with Fox Television in a manager position. As a former music teacher, I am very proud of my pupils' achievements in their own lives.

From my earlier days in the Army Band, Major Tom Whalan had given me the drive and ability to perform later in life in my professional career too, playing multiple keyboards, orchestrating in my head and even playing a trumpet in one hand while playing the keyboards with my left hand. With the advent of MIDI, I was able to play live - not relying on preprogrammed tracks on disc. Hence, I became known as Phil Crawshaw and his "Phil harmonic orchestra" not only backing many of the club acts in Sydney and overseas - but performing in Australia and America as a Panasonic Concert Artist from 1980 up until 2010.

Vale Niels Rosendahl #700

We wish to pass on our sincere condolences to Niels' family and friends at this sad time.

In the heart of Canberra, a city known for its political hustle and bustling government activities, lived a man whose life made a profound impact on the local community. Vale Billo Smith #18

In the last newsletter we had learned of the passing of MAGA Honorary Member Billo Smith (#18) who left us peacefully on July 31 aged 92.

Billo was a long time MAGA member and played Saxophone and Harmonica. He joined the Musician's Union in 1948 where he started work playing 3rd alto with his father Billo Smith Snr who was leader of the band at Cloudland Ballroom, Brisbane.

W. J. "Billo" Smith (1930 - 2023) was born to professional musicians at Brisbane, Australia. He studied piano from age five, but his musical career really began at 13 when he studied clarinet with his father, a prominent Brisbane musician and band leader. At 17, the younger Billo joined his father Billo Smith senior's 12 piece band at the famed Cloudland Ballroom, playing sax and clarinet. Aspiring to a classical career, he won the Queensland clarinet championship at Brisbane Eisteddfod in 1956. A scholarship to enter the New South Wales Conservatorium followed, where he studied clarinet, piano. Whilst there, he took up oboe, flute and double bass, playing for many classical recitals. Billo jnr was appointed principal clarinetist with the Conservatorium orchestra. He also sang in a Minotti opera. After 2 years full-time study he realised his forte lay in the jazz arena. In 1972 he moved to Queensland's Gold Coast where he teamed up with ex Horrie Dargie men, Vern Moore and 'Doc' Bertram, to form a vocal and harmonica trio with the Ted Preston Band, which was based at the Tweed Heads Bowls Club. Although Billo retired from playing professionally in 1995, he remained heavily involved in composing, arranging and publishing music in all styles. His musical focus shifted to more Christian themes in the latter decades of his life. He also recorded several CDs which were published independently, playing the lead on his alto saxophone.

Who's Doing What?

2023 started with a concert for Ne-Yo and the National Symphony at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC. The summer (US/Europe) was super busy with arrangements for Sophie Hunger and the Bern Symphony, Gustavo Santaolalla and the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra, Rampage at the Barbican with the Jules Buckley Orchestra, Stevie Wonder and Shelea with the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra for Quincy's 90th celebration, Corinne Bailey Rae with the Metropole Orkest at the North Sea Jazz Festival, and finally Cory Henry at the BBC Proms with the Jules Buckley Orchestra. I also worked on several adaptations for Steve Vai and the Metropol. Performances of existing works included Anoushka Shankar with the National Symphony and Maxwell also with the NSO and San Francisco Symphony. I am currently working on arrangements for Pete Tong Ibiza Classics and a very special arrangement for the National Symphony.

There are also several movies that have come out this year for which I conducted and orchestrated, including Antman and the Wasp: Quantumania, Shazam! Fury of the Gods, Cocaine Bear, The Magician's Elephant, Vacation Friends 2 and Blue Beetle. In August Star Trek: Strange New Worlds premiered a musical episode that I orchestrated and conducted. I also contributed orchestrations to Transformers: Rise of the Beasts, Fast Charlie, and TV shows Outer Banks and Fire Country. In the can but not out yet is Jerry Seinfeld's Unfrosted. I have just started work on Kingdom of the Planet of the Apes which I will be conducting the score for in Australia early 2024!

Kieran Hurley (MAGA 644) has had a busy year so far, with more to come. His 4th full show for the Darwin Symphony Orchestra, a 20 song show called "The Rhythm of the 90's" was performed in front of 8000 people at the Darwin Botanic Gardens Amphitheatre in July. Kieran was also commissioned to compose a Kids Medley for the Arafura Wind Ensemble, premiered in June 2023, and continues his partnership with the Northern Territory School of Music, writing music for their 2023 and 2024 'Beats Festival' held in Darwin and Alice Springs.

In Perth he has just completed and conducted another show for Akanna Entertainment. This show, titled "The Music of the Night: An Enchanted Evening with Andrew Lloyd-Webber" involved orchestrating for a 20-piece Orchestra, 50-piece WASO Chorus and 3 soloists. He has continued writing for many schools within WA, the Perth Symphony Orchestra and is writing and recording with his String/Vocal Sextet "Court in the Crosshairs". He is looking forward to performing, conducting, and arranging his way into 2024 with another 2 full show commissions (DSO and AKANNA) and many other individual projects (Manteca Fusion Band, Arafura Wind Ensemble, Court in the Crosshairs, PSO and WASO) coming into view. He has also started on his first Concerto, a Concerto for Jazz Saxophone(s) and Orchestra, that should be finished and premiered in late 2024.


